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Executive Summary

Survey Background

The 2021 City of Bloomington Community Survey provided residents the opportunity to rate the quality of life in the City of Bloomington, as well as the quality of service delivery and overall performance of local government. The survey also permitted residents to provide feedback on what is working well and what is not, and to share their view of priorities related to projects or issues facing the City.

Surveys were mailed to 3,000 randomly selected resident households starting in March 2021. A total of 527 surveys were completed, yielding a response rate of 19%. In addition to the random sample survey, a link to an online open participation survey was publicized by the City through various channels. The open participation survey was identical to the random sample survey and open to all Bloomington residents. A total of 235 open participation surveys were completed (for additional information on the open participation survey results, please see the *Bloomington Supplemental Web Report 2021* under separate cover).

Survey results were weighted so that respondent's housing tenure (rent or own), housing unit type (attached or detached), race/ethnicity, gender, age, and area were presented in proportions reflective of the entire city. The margin of error is four percentage points around any given percentage point reported for all respondents (527 completes).

Key Findings

Overall, Bloomington residents continue to have a positive quality of life.

- About 9 in 10 residents favorably reviewed Bloomington as a place to live, while 8 in 10 gave high marks to the overall quality of life and the community as a place to visit; the latter rating improved from 2019 to 2021.
- Three-quarters of respondents gave excellent or good marks to Bloomington as a place to raise children and their neighborhoods as a place to live; while this was on par with national and peer comparison communities, these ratings declined from 2019 to 2021.
- Residents remained loyal to Bloomington with 8 in 10 indicating they would recommend living in the community to someone who asked and 6 in 10 planning to remain in the city for the next five years.
- About 6 in 10 survey participants assigned positive reviews to the community making all residents feel welcome, attracting people from diverse backgrounds, and valuing/respecting residents from diverse backgrounds, which was similar to communities across the country.
- The second most common response when residents were asked what they liked most about living in Bloomington was the sense of community and small town feel (14%).

Government performance ratings declined in 2021, highlighting opportunities for improvements and better connections with residents.

- Similar to nationwide and peer comparison communities, three-quarters of residents assigned positive reviews to the overall quality of services provided by the City of Bloomington (73% excellent or good). While this rating was similar to 2019, it has been trending down since 2017.
- About two-thirds of residents appreciated the value of services for the taxes they paid and half praised the overall direction the City is taking, the job the government does at welcoming citizen involvement, and the City generally acting in the best interest of the community. Fewer than half gave high ratings to treating all residents fairly, overall confidence in the City government, informing residents about issues facing the community, being honest/transparent, treating all residents with respect, and listening to public concern. All of these ratings declined from 2019 to 2021, except the value of services for the taxes paid to the City, which remained stable.
- While most ratings were similar to the national and peer benchmarks, assessments of treating all residents with respect and treating all residents fairly were lower than the national averages.
- In line with 2019, about 4 in 10 had contacted City of Bloomington staff within the 12 months prior to taking the survey; yet ratings of their overall impression of the staff member and the staff member's knowledge, courteousness, and responsiveness declined in 2021.

Residents feel safe in the community overall, yet police interactions may be an area of focus.

- Community members feel safe in Bloomington, with 7 in 10 providing excellent or good ratings to the overall feeling of safety in Bloomington; although this rating declined from 2019 to 2021.
- Almost all residents felt safe in their neighborhood (94%) and Bloomington's downtown area (92%) during the day. Three-quarters felt safe in their neighborhood at night while 6 in 10 felt safe in the downtown area at night. Feelings of safety in different areas of the community remained stable over time.
- Additionally, a majority of residents reported feeling safe from fire, flood, or other natural disaster (85%), from violent crime (74%), and from property crime (62%).
- When providing feedback on the quality of City services, residents were especially appreciative of safety services, including fire services (91%), ambulance or emergency medical services (87%) and fire prevention and education (76%).
- However, assessments of police services and crime prevention declined from 2019 to 2021 and lagged behind the national averages. Also fewer residents gave favorable evaluations to their interaction with the Bloomington Police Department in 2021; about 4 in 10 awarded excellent or good reviews while 8 in 10 indicated this was essential or very important for the community to focus on.

Residents have concerns about housing and affordability.

- Less than half of respondents praised the availability of affordable childcare/preschool, mental health care, health care, and housing options in Bloomington. Reviews of the availability of affordable quality health care and housing options were below the national benchmarks and assessments of the availability of affordable health care, mental health care, and preventive health services were lower than those in their peer group. About one-third gave excellent or good marks to well-planned residential growth, which lagged behind other communities nationwide.
- From 2019 to 2021, ratings for the variety of housing options, cost of living, the overall development of a variety of housing options in downtown, and the availability of affordable housing options, mental health care, and childcare/preschool declined. Some of these differences may be at least partially attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- About 10% of respondents indicated that affordable housing was the thing they liked least about living in Bloomington.

Addressing homelessness is an increasing priority for residents.

- Only 3 in 10 residents gave excellent or good marks to the Bloomington community taking care of vulnerable residents (elderly, disabled, homeless, etc.), which was lower than the national benchmark.
- When residents were asked what their least favorite thing about Bloomington was, issues related to homelessness topped the list, with 29% mentioning this.
- About three-quarters of respondents stated that homelessness was a major challenge (an increase from 2019) and 22% said it was a moderate challenge.
- Similar to 2019, at least 9 in 10 Bloomington participants would strongly or somewhat support the City assisting with supportive housing for residents who are experiencing homelessness, which includes housing with services such as job training and substance abuse programs; 75% strongly supported this which was an increase from 2019 (63%).

Education, arts, and culture contribute to quality of life in Bloomington.

- Residents' assessments of the overall opportunities for education and enrichment and adult educational opportunities were exceptional and above average compared to communities across the country and in their peer group, with most respondents awarding favorable marks (92% and 83% respectively).
- About 12% of residents noted entertainment and cultural activities and 7% said access to educational opportunities as the thing they liked the most about living in Bloomington.
- Community support for the arts was the top rated community feature. About 9 in 10 assigned positive reviews, a rating that eclipsed communities across the nation.
- Roughly 8 in 10 respondents gave high marks to opportunities to attend cultural/arts/music activities; this rating was outstanding and higher than the national and peer benchmarks.

Survey Administration

Survey Purposes

The City of Bloomington contracted with Polco's National Research Center, Inc. (NRC) to conduct a community-wide survey. The 2021 survey was the third iteration of the survey in the City of Bloomington. The primary goal of the survey was to assess the attitudes and opinions of residents by:

- determining general perceptions of the quality of life in the city,
- evaluating City programs and services,
- identifying projects or issues facing the city and
- setting benchmarks for future surveys.

The City of Bloomington Community Survey serves as a consumer report card for Bloomington by providing residents the opportunity to rate many aspects of life in the city. Focus on the quality of service delivery of services can help council, staff and the public to set priorities for budget decisions and lays the groundwork for tracking community opinions about the core responsibilities of Bloomington City government, helping to assure maximum service quality over time.

Not only does this survey work to understand overall quality of life, but it also gets at the key services that local government control to create a quality community. It is akin to private sector customer surveys that are used regularly by many corporations to monitor where there are weaknesses in product or service delivery before customers defect to competition or before other problems from dissatisfied customers arise.

Survey Administration

In March 2021, a postcard was mailed to 3,000 Bloomington households, selected at random, notifying residents that they had been chosen to participate in the survey. The postcard include a URL so they could complete the survey online if they preferred. A survey followed in the mail after one week and another survey packet was mailed a week later. The cover letter was signed by the Mayor and included a URL to give residents the option to take the survey online. There were 527 survey respondents, including 255 surveys completed online, yielding a response rate of 19%. The margin of error is plus or minus four percentage points around any given percentage for all respondents (527).

The results were weighted to reflect the demographic profile of all residents in the City of Bloomington.

How the Results are Reported

For the most part, frequency distributions and the “percent positive” are presented in the body of the report. The percent positive is the combination of the top two most positive response options (i.e., “excellent” and “good,” “strongly agree” and “somewhat agree”).

On many of the questions in the survey, respondents can give an answer of “don’t know.” The proportion of respondents giving this reply is shown in the full set of responses included in *Appendix B: Complete Set of Survey Responses* and is discussed in the body of this report if it is 30% or greater. However, these responses have been removed from the analyses presented in the body of the report, unless otherwise indicated. In other words, the majority of the figures in the body of the report display the responses from respondents who had an opinion about a specific item.

For some questions, respondents were permitted to select multiple responses. When the total exceeds 100% in a table for a multiple response question, it is because some respondents are counted in multiple categories. When a table for a question that only permitted a single response does not total to exactly 100%, it is due to the customary practice of rounding values to the nearest whole number.

Precision of Estimates

It is customary to describe the precision of estimates made from surveys by a “level of confidence” and accompanying “confidence interval” (or margin of error). The 95 percent confidence interval for this survey is generally no greater than plus or minus 4% around any given percent reported for all survey respondents (527). For comparisons among subgroups, the margin of error rises to approximately plus or minus 5% for subgroups of 400 to plus or minus 10% for subgroups of 100.

Comparisons of Results over Time

Because this survey was the third iteration of the community survey, the 2017 and 2019 results are presented when comparisons to 2021 were available. Where differences in ratings from 2019 to 2021 are six percentage points or greater, they can be considered significantly higher or lower.

Comparing Survey Results by Respondent Subgroups

Select survey results were compared by length of residency, housing tenure (rent or own), gender, age, and student status (full- or part-time students or not a student) of survey respondents as well as the geographic location of respondent households. These comparisons are discussed throughout the body of the report, when applicable. These crosstabulations are summarized and presented in tabular form in *Appendix D: Responses to*

Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics. Where differences between subgroups are statistically significant, they are marked with an upper case letter.

Comparing Survey Results to Other Communities

NRC's database of comparative resident opinion comprises resident perspectives gathered in resident surveys from over 600 jurisdictions whose residents evaluated local government services. Conducted with typically no fewer than 400 residents in each jurisdiction, opinions are intended to represent over 30 million Americans.

Communities to which Bloomington is compared can be found in *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*. National benchmark comparisons and peer community (communities that have a university and a similar median household income) benchmark comparisons have been provided when similar questions on the Bloomington survey are included in NRC's database and there are at least five jurisdictions in which the question was asked.

When comparisons for quality ratings were available, Bloomington's results are noted as being "higher" than the benchmark, "lower" than the benchmark or "similar" to the benchmark, meaning that the average rating given by of City residents is statistically similar to or different (greater or lesser) than the benchmark. Being rated as "higher" or "lower" than the benchmark means that Bloomington's average rating for a particular item was more than 10 points different than the benchmark. If a rating was "much higher" or "much lower," then Bloomington's average rating was more than 20 points different when compared to the benchmark. Comparisons for a number of items on the survey are not available in the benchmark database. These items are excluded from the benchmark tables.

The survey was administered during the COVID-19 pandemic, a time of challenge for many local governments. While we provide comparisons to community benchmarks, it is important to note that much of the benchmark data was collected prior to the pandemic. This may impact how your City's 2021 ratings compare to other communities' ratings from the past three to four years.

Survey Findings

Quality of Life and Community

The City of Bloomington Community Survey contained a set of questions related to quality of community life in the city ranging from the overall quality of life to Bloomington as a place to work, visit, and retire. Survey respondents were also asked to indicate how likely they would be to remain in the community and recommend it to others.

Quality of Life

As in 2019, Bloomington residents were pleased with their overall quality of life, with about 8 in 10 giving high marks. This rating was on par with residents in national and peer benchmark communities (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons* for detailed information on the benchmark comparisons).

Survey results were compared by geographic location of residency and select respondent demographic characteristics. Survey participants who lived in the southeast, southwest, and northeast regions of the city gave higher evaluations to the overall quality of life in Bloomington than those who lived in the northwest quadrant. No differences were noted based on respondent demographics (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*).

Please rate the overall quality of life in the City of Bloomington.

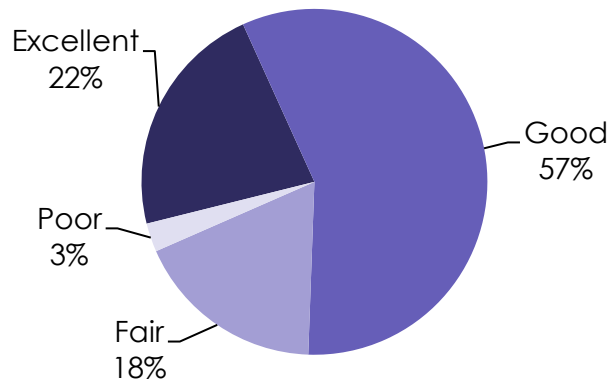
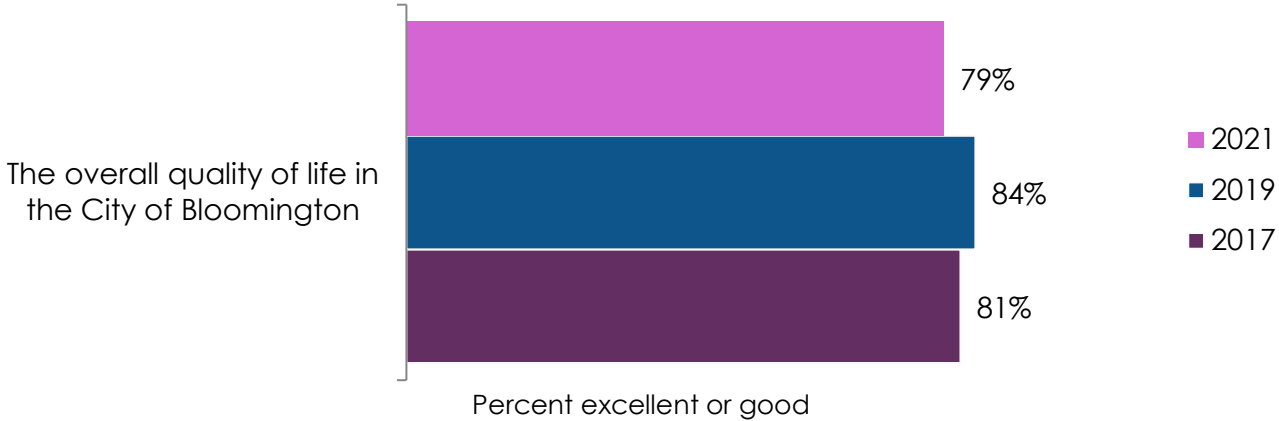


Figure 2: Quality of Life Compared by Year

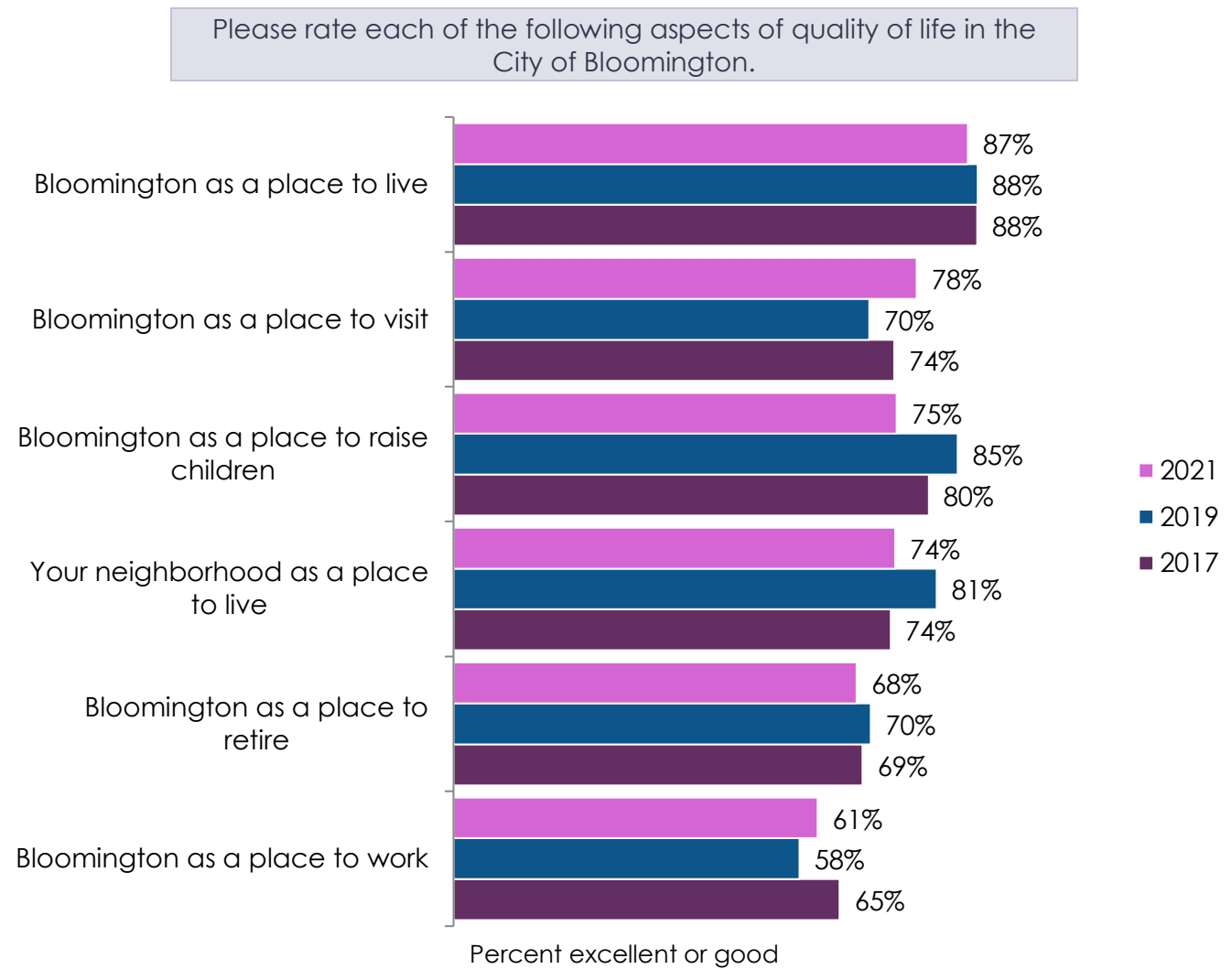

For aspects that enhance quality of life, at least 7 in 10 praised Bloomington as a place to live, as a place to raise children, as a place to visit, and their neighborhoods as places to live. At least 6 in 10 awarded high marks to the community as a place to work and as a place to retire. Evaluations for Bloomington as a place to visit improved in 2021 compared to 2019, while residents were more critical of the city as a place to raise children and their neighborhoods as places to live over time. Residents’ ratings for all of these items were on par with national and peer averages (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

When differences were significant, homeowners awarded higher marks than renters to aspects of quality of life. Survey participants who lived in the northern sections of the city felt more positively about Bloomington as a place to visit compared to those who lived in the southeast quadrant (for additional comparisons by respondent demographics, see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*.)

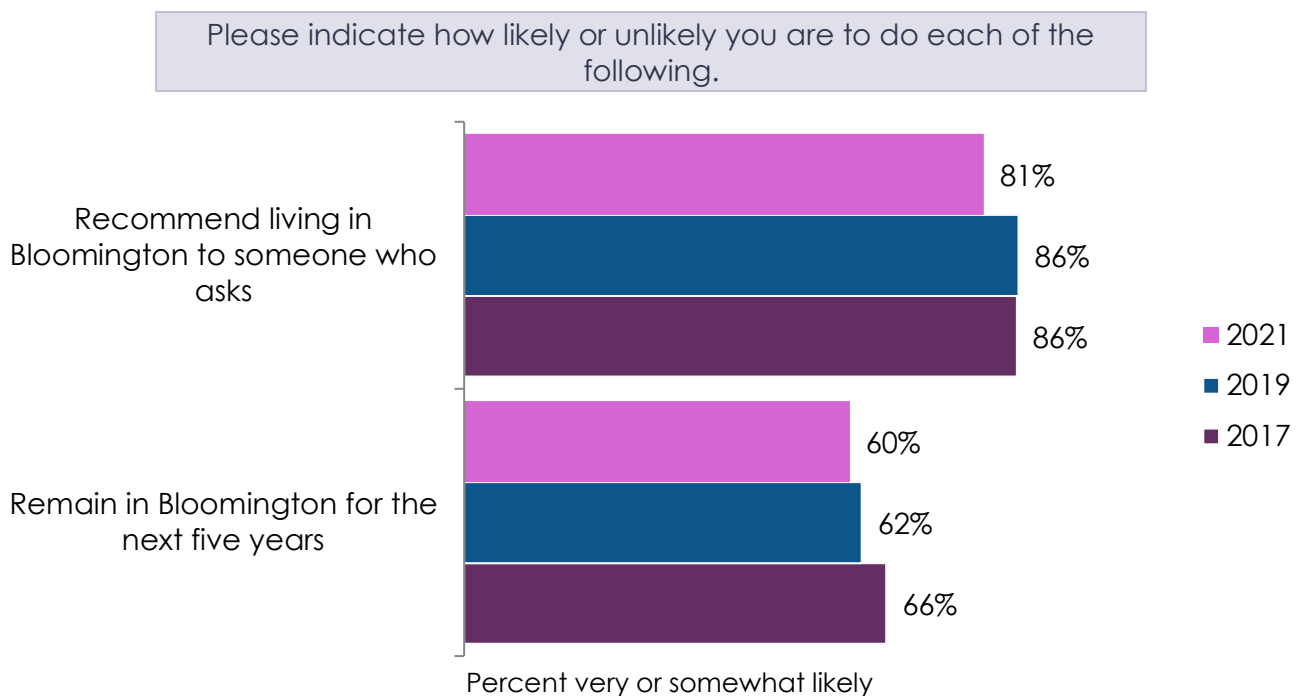
Figure 3: Aspects of Quality of Life Compared by Year



Residents remain loyal to Bloomington with 8 in 10 indicating they would recommend living in the community to someone who asked and about 6 in 10 stating they planned to remain in the community for the next five years, levels similar to 2019. While respondents were equally as likely to recommend their city compared to communities nationally and in other peer cities, they were less likely to plan to remain in the city (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

Homeowners, females, non-students and those over age 25 were more likely to plan on living in the community for the next five years than their counterparts. Residents who lived in the northwest quadrant were more likely to recommend living in the city (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*). Additionally, residents in the northeast quadrant were less likely to plan to remain in Bloomington for the next five years compared to the other quadrants.

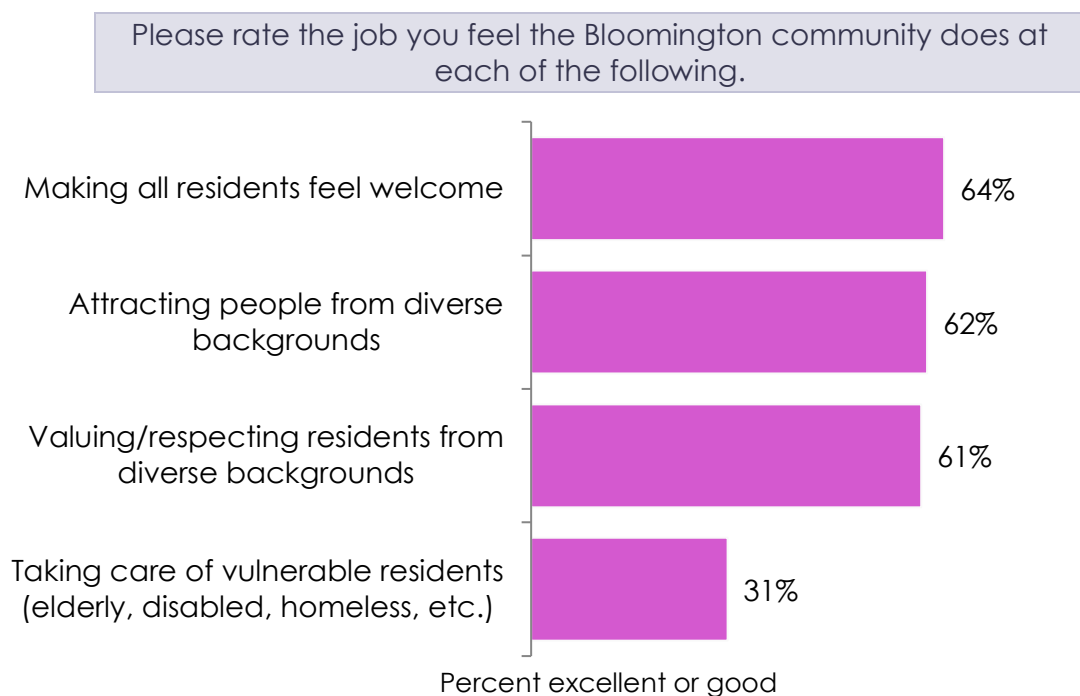
Figure 4: Resident Loyalty Compared by Year



About 6 in 10 residents positively rated the Bloomington community at making all residents feel welcome, attracting people from diverse backgrounds, and valuing/respecting residents from diverse backgrounds. Only 3 in 10 felt similarly about the community taking care of vulnerable residents, such as the elderly, disabled, and homeless. Respondents' assessments were similar to the national benchmarks, except for taking care of vulnerable residents, which was lower than the national (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

Those who had lived in the community for more than 20 years, homeowners, non-students, and those over age 25 were more likely to give positive marks to the community taking care of vulnerable residents than their counterparts. Residents who lived in the northeast quadrant were more likely to give high ratings to the community making all residents feel welcome, attracting people from diverse backgrounds, and valuing/respecting residents from diverse backgrounds compared to residents who lived in the other quadrants (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*).

Overall Community Characteristics

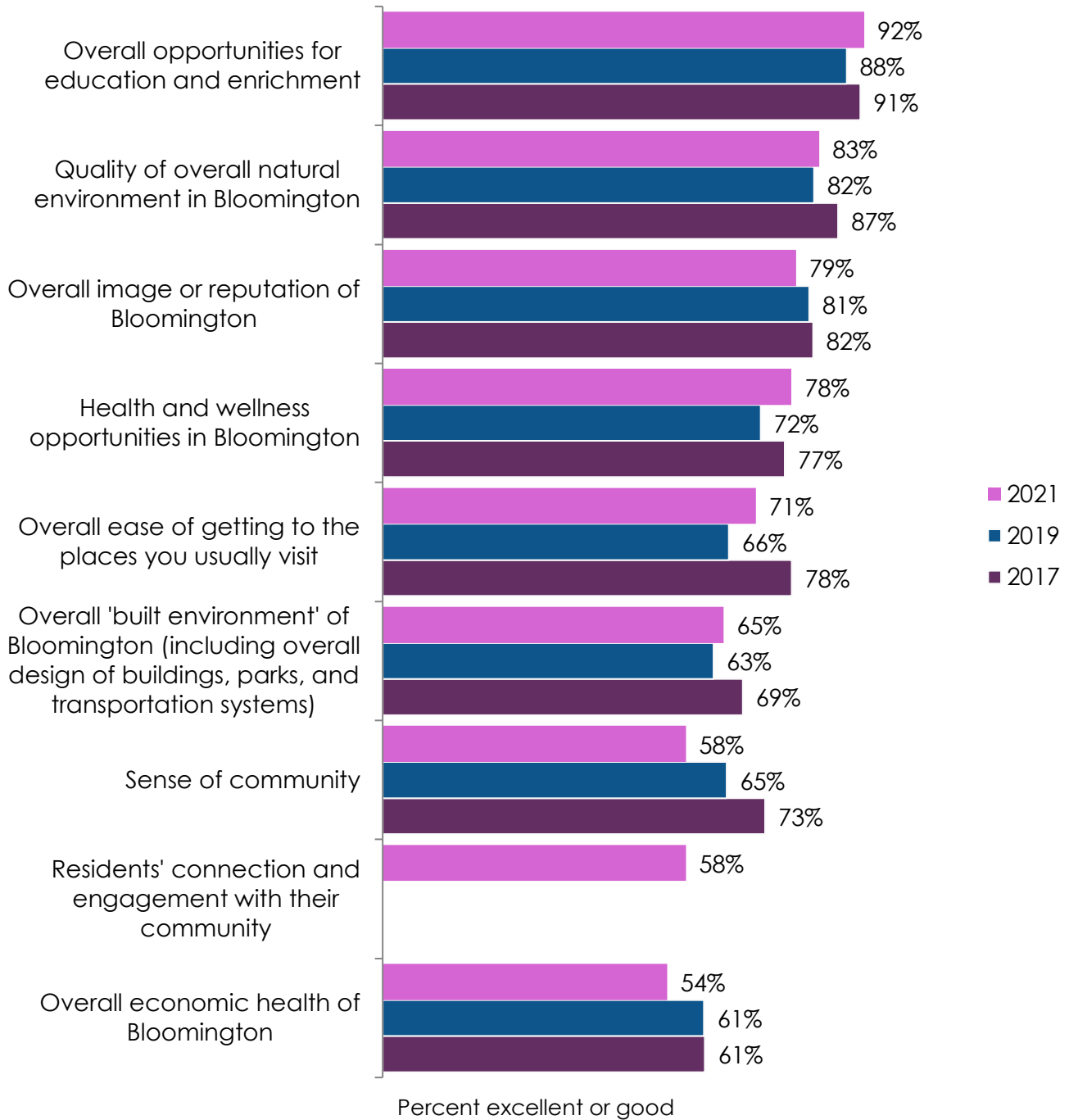
City leadership asked residents to provide their opinions on characteristics that define a community. Around 9 in 10 participants appreciated the overall opportunities for education and enrichment and about 8 in 10 praised the natural environment, the city's image or reputation, and health and wellness opportunities. Additionally, about 7 in 10 residents were pleased with the ease of navigating places they have to visit. Roughly 6 in 10 gave high marks to the sense of community in Bloomington, residents' connection and engagement with their community, and the overall built environment, while half positively reviewed the overall economic health of Bloomington. Ratings for health and wellness opportunities improved since 2019, while evaluations of sense of community and overall economic health declined over time.

Overall, most ratings of the overall characteristics of Bloomington were similar to the benchmark groups. However, evaluations of the overall opportunities for education and enrichment outpaced national and peer averages, while assessments of the overall ease of getting to the places you usually visit outpaced national averages (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

Patterns of differences based on respondent demographics were difficult to discern; however, residents who had lived in Bloomington for more than 2 years were more likely to give favorable ratings to the overall economic health of the community than residents who had lived in the community for less than two years. Residents from the northwest portion of Bloomington were more critical of the overall quality of the natural environment, overall economic health, and residents' connection and engagement with their community than residents in other quadrants (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*).

Community Features

Delving deeper into features that help shape the livability of a community, survey respondents rated a list of more than 20 aspects which contribute to quality of life. Residents were most appreciative of community support for the arts (89% excellent or good), opportunities to volunteer (87%), and opportunities to attend cultural/arts/music activities (85%). Other high performing characteristics included adult educational opportunities, fitness opportunities, recreational opportunities, air quality, overall appearance of the city, and K-12 education, with 8 in 10 giving excellent or good reviews. Less than half of respondents felt positively about aspects related to affordability (e.g., cost of living and the availability of affordable housing and childcare/preschool options) and to housing and development items.

Residents' opinions of these community features generally remained stable over time; yet declines were observed in 2021 for ratings of opportunities to attend cultural/art/music activities, openness and acceptance of the community towards people of diverse backgrounds, variety of housing options, availability of affordable quality childcare/preschool and mental health care, cost of living, overall development of a variety of housing options in downtown, and the availability of affordable housing options. Some of these may be at least partially attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Ratings for opportunities to attend cultural/arts/music activities and adult educational opportunities surpassed national and peer communities. Additionally, evaluations of community support for the arts, opportunities to volunteer, and vibrancy of the downtown/commercial area each exceeded ratings from cities across the country. Reviews for availability of affordable health care, affordable housing options, and affordable childcare/preschool, as well as well-planned residential growth tended to be lower than the national averages. Evaluations of the availability of affordable health care, mental health care, and preventive health services were also lower than peer communities. For more detailed information about these comparisons, see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*.

Comparisons by geography revealed that northwest survey respondents provided lower scores to the availability of affordable health care, mental health care, and preventive health services than residents in other regions. Residents between the ages of 18 and 24 gave higher marks to the overall appearance of the community and public places where people want to spend time than residents age 35 and older (Please see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics* for additional comparisons by respondent demographics).

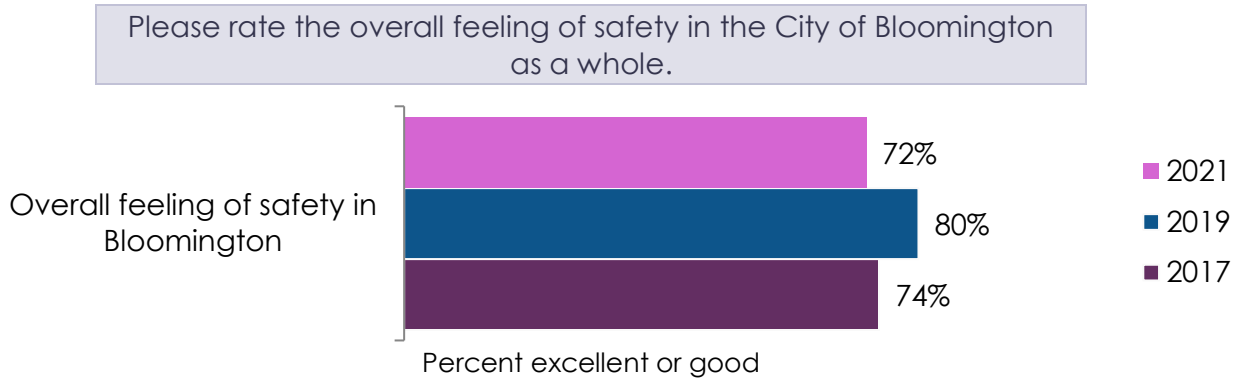

Note: About 30% of respondents answered “don't know” when asked to rate well-planned commercial growth and the availability of preventive health services and mental health care. About 69% answered “don't know” when asked to rate the availability of affordable childcare/preschool and 55% when asked to rate K-12 education.

Safety

Residents felt safe in Bloomington, as about 7 in 10 awarded top marks to the overall feeling of safety in the community, yet this was lower than ratings in 2019 and on par with levels reported in 2017. When compared to other communities, Bloomington residents reported feelings of safety were similar (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

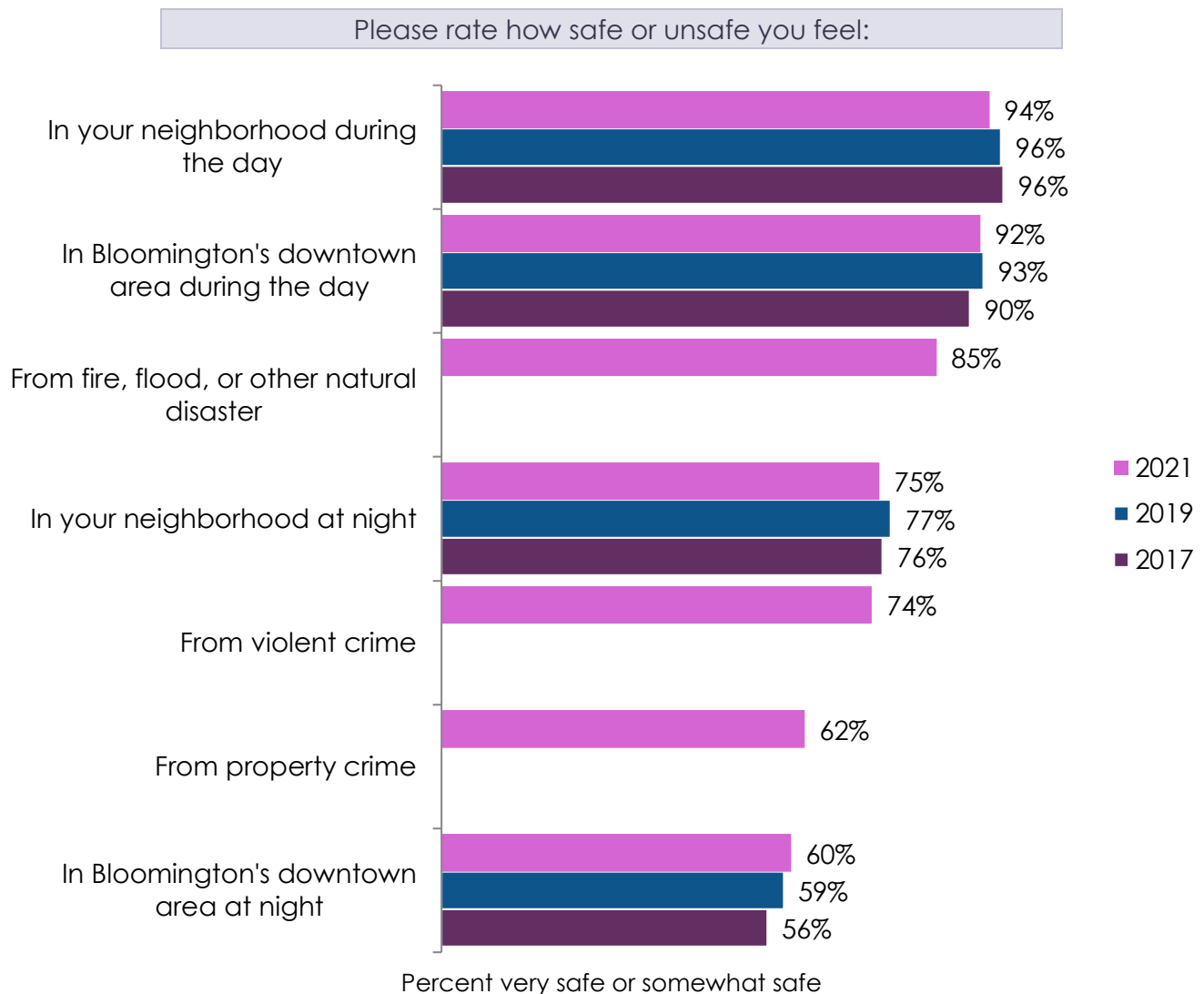
Figure 8: Overall Feeling of Safety in Bloomington Compared by Year



Respondents also felt safe in various areas around the city, with nearly all indicating they felt very or somewhat safe in their neighborhoods and the downtown area during the day. About three-quarters of community members also felt safe in their neighborhoods after dark and 6 in 10 felt safe at night in downtown Bloomington. These levels have remained steady since the last survey administration, and when comparisons could be made, were similar to both the national and peer benchmark comparisons (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*). Furthermore, a majority of residents felt safe from fire, flood, or other natural disaster (85%), from violent crime (74%), and from property crime (62%). These safety evaluations also were on par with the national average (comparisons to peers were not available).

Homeowners and males felt safer in their neighborhoods at night. When comparing based on geography, participants from the southeast felt less secure in Bloomington’s downtown area at night compared to their peers (*Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*).

Mobility

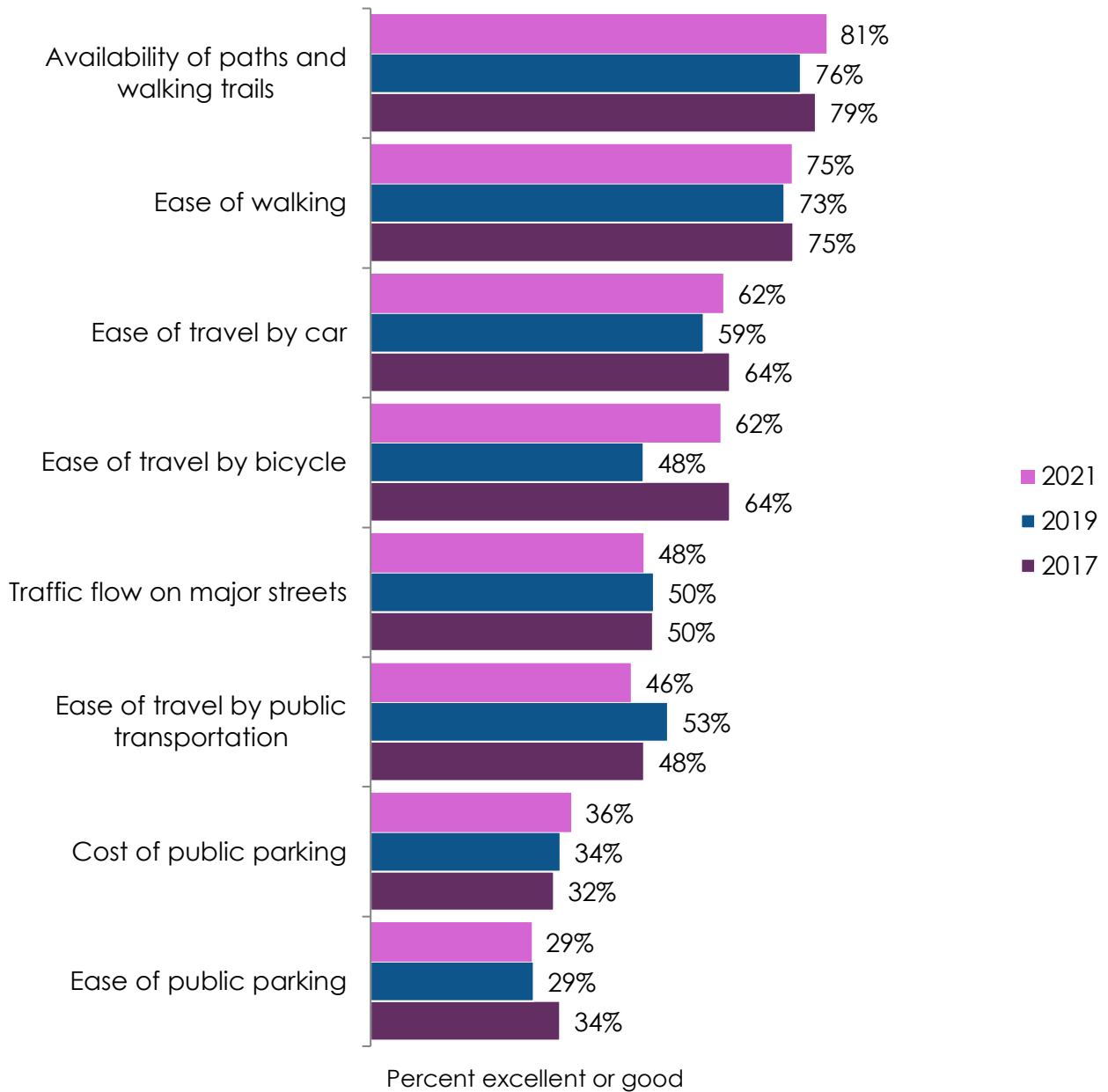
For measures related to the ease of navigating the city, residents were most pleased with pedestrian travel, including the availability of paths and walking trails (81% excellent or good) and ease of walking (75%). About 6 in 10 respondents enjoyed their ability to travel with ease via car and bicycle, with the latter rating increasing by 14% from 2019 to 2021. However, fewer residents positively rated the ease of travel by public transportation in 2021 (46%), which may be partially attributable to limitations due to COVID-19. One-third or less of respondents gave high marks to cost and ease of public parking.

When comparisons could be made, assessments for most measures related to transportation were similar to those provided in other communities nationally and within peer cities, though ratings for ease of public parking lagged behind national averages (*Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

Few differences were seen among different demographic groups; however, those who had lived in the community for more than six years were more positive about ease of travel by public transportation than those who had lived there for less than two years. Respondents from the eastern regions were more likely than respondents in the western regions to give high marks to ease of travel by public transportation (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics* for more information).

Please rate each of the following characteristics as they relate to the City of Bloomington as a whole.

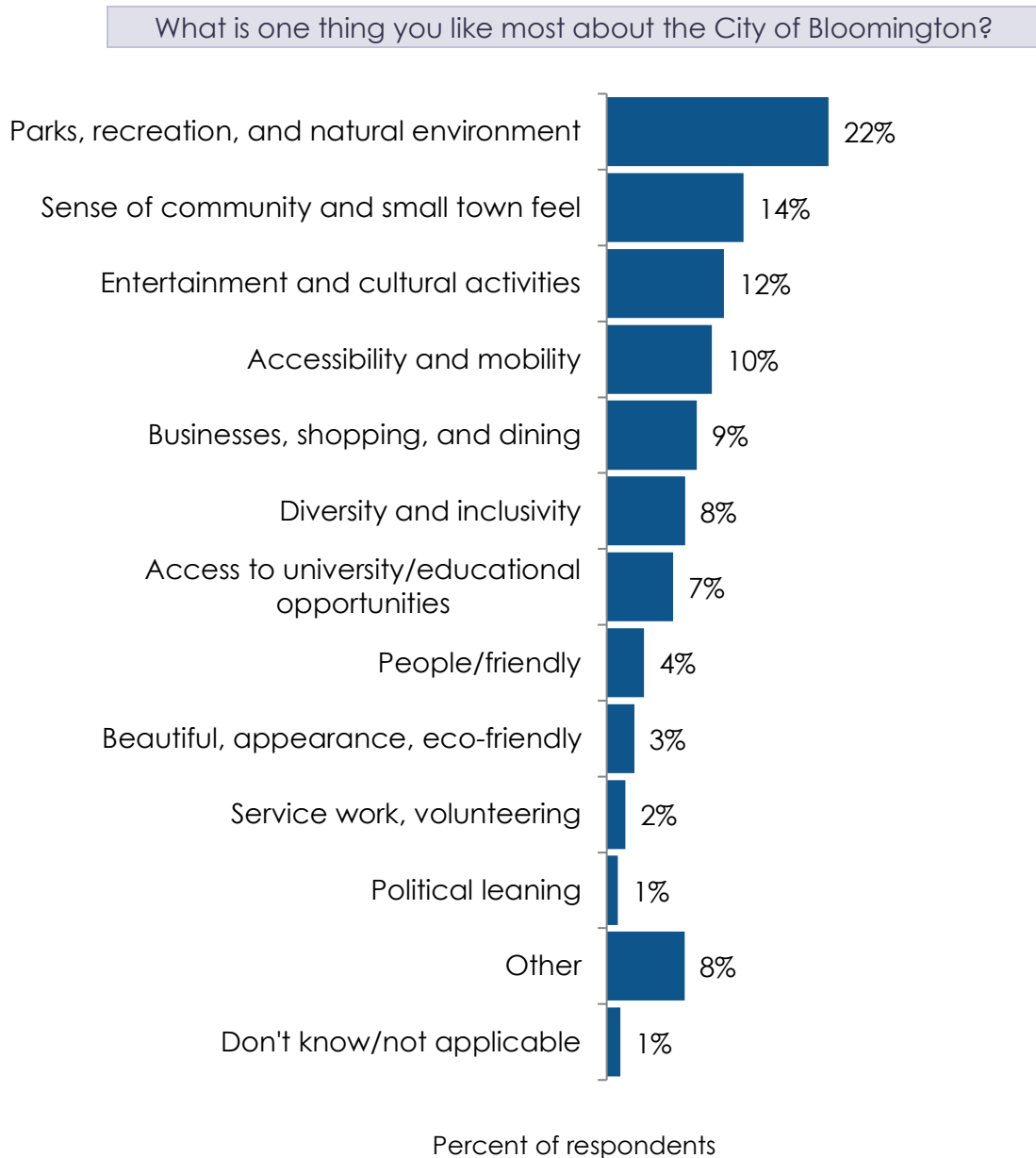

Living in Bloomington

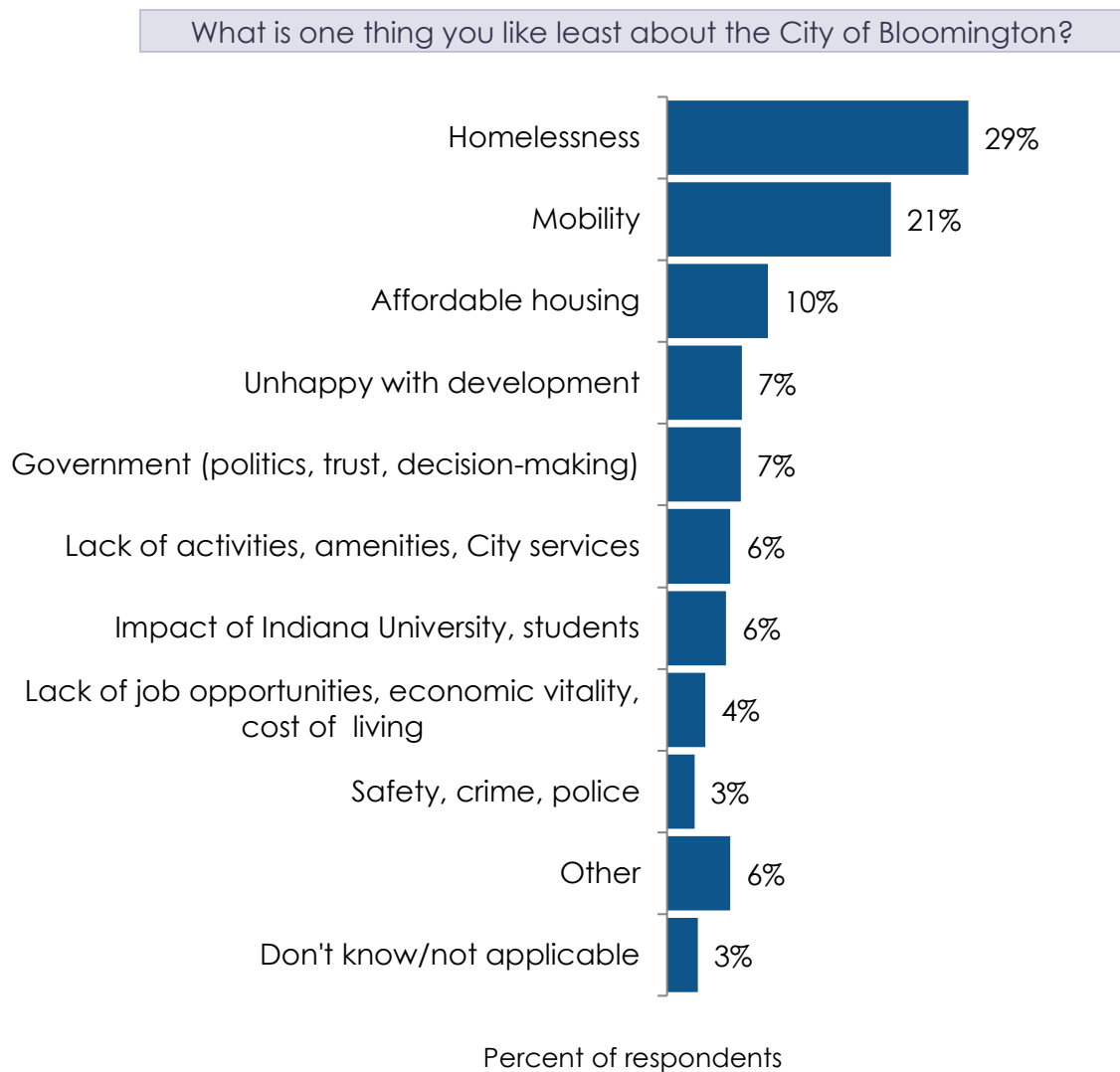
When asked to choose their favorite thing about living in Bloomington, 472 of the 527 respondents provided an answer. Of these, 22% of individuals were delighted with parks, recreation, and the natural environment; 14% regarded the sense of community and small town feel as a win, and 12% were pleased with entertainment and cultural activities in Bloomington. About 10% of participants were grateful for the accessibility and mobility of the community; the businesses, shopping, and dining opportunities; and the diversity and inclusivity of the community. All written responses, including any “other” comments can be found in *Appendix C: Verbatim Responses*.

In addition to considering what they like most about living in Bloomington, residents were asked what they liked least about living in the city. Of the 476 respondents that had written a response, about 3 in 10 identified an issue related to homelessness in the community. About 2 in 10 cited mobility issues (roads, traffic, public transportation or other issues) and 1 in 10 mentioned affordable housing. About 6-7% noted concerns with development, government, lack of activities/amenities/City services, and the impact of Indiana University and their students. 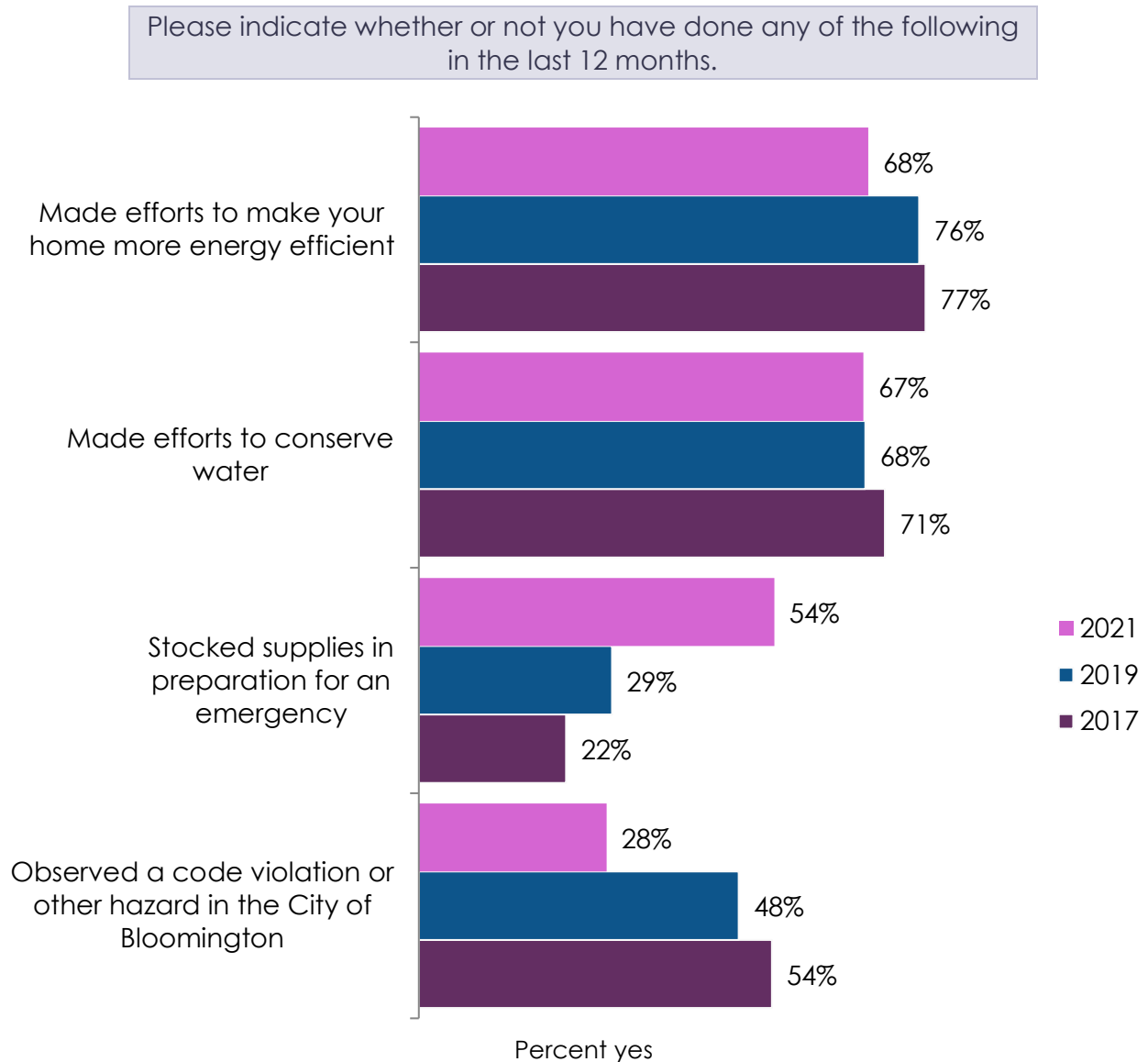
Figure 12: Like Least about Living in Bloomington, 2021



Community Participation

About two-thirds of Bloomington residents reported participating in green behaviors, such as making their homes energy efficient (declined from 2019) and conserving water. Around half reported they had stocked supplies in preparation for an emergency, which was a substantial increase from 2019 (likely due in part to COVID), and one-quarter observed a code violation, which was lower than rates in 2019.

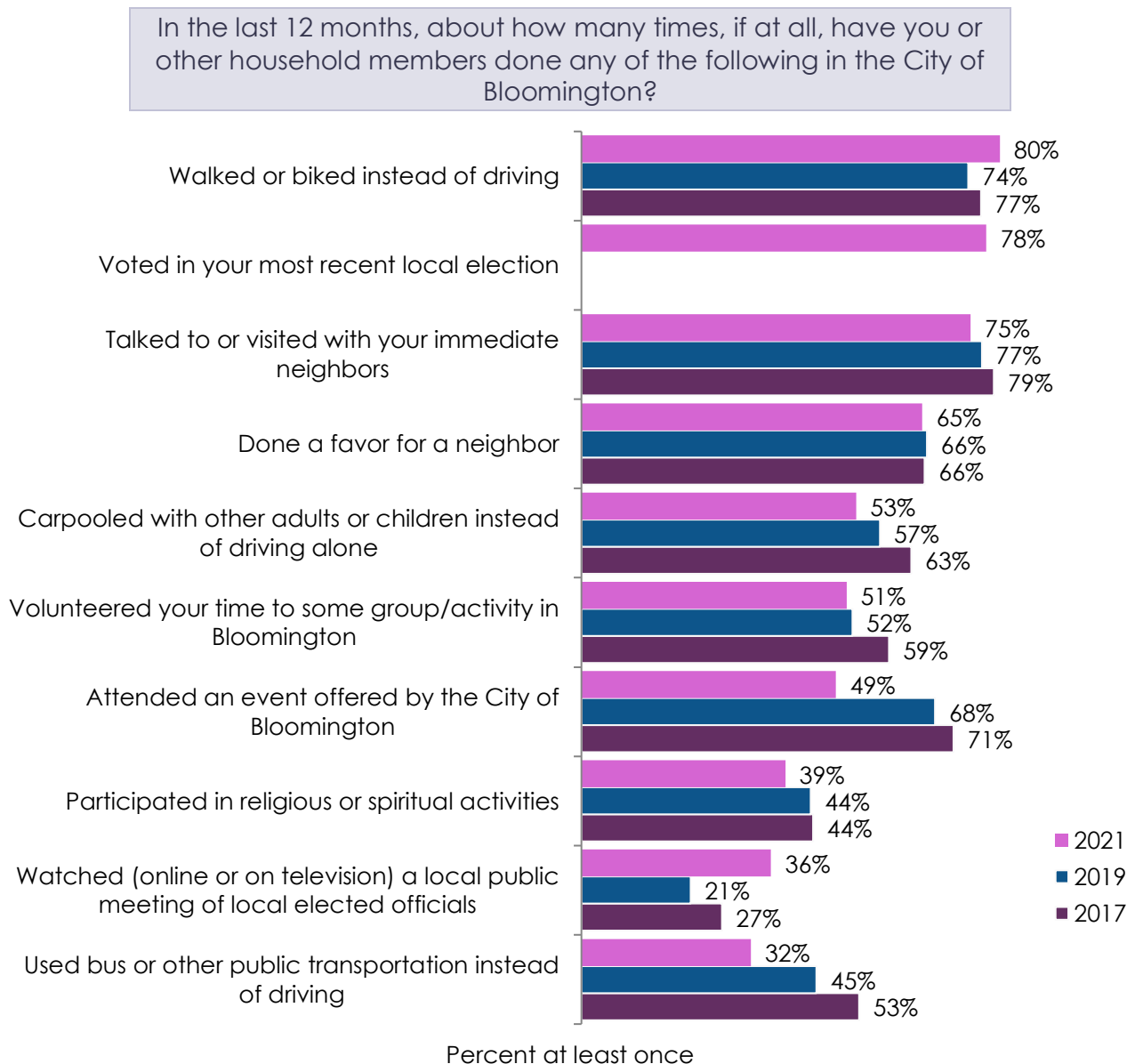
Figure 13: Community Participation Compared by Year



About 8 in 10 respondents reported walking or biking instead of driving (increased since 2019), while half had carpooled and one-third had used public transportation (decreased since 2019). Three-quarters of residents had talked to or visited with their neighbors and two-thirds had done a favor for a neighbor. Half or fewer residents had volunteered their time, attended an event offered by the City (decreased since 2019), participated in religious or spiritual activities, or watched a local public meeting (increased since 2019). Some of these declines are likely attributable to closures and changes due to COVID-19.

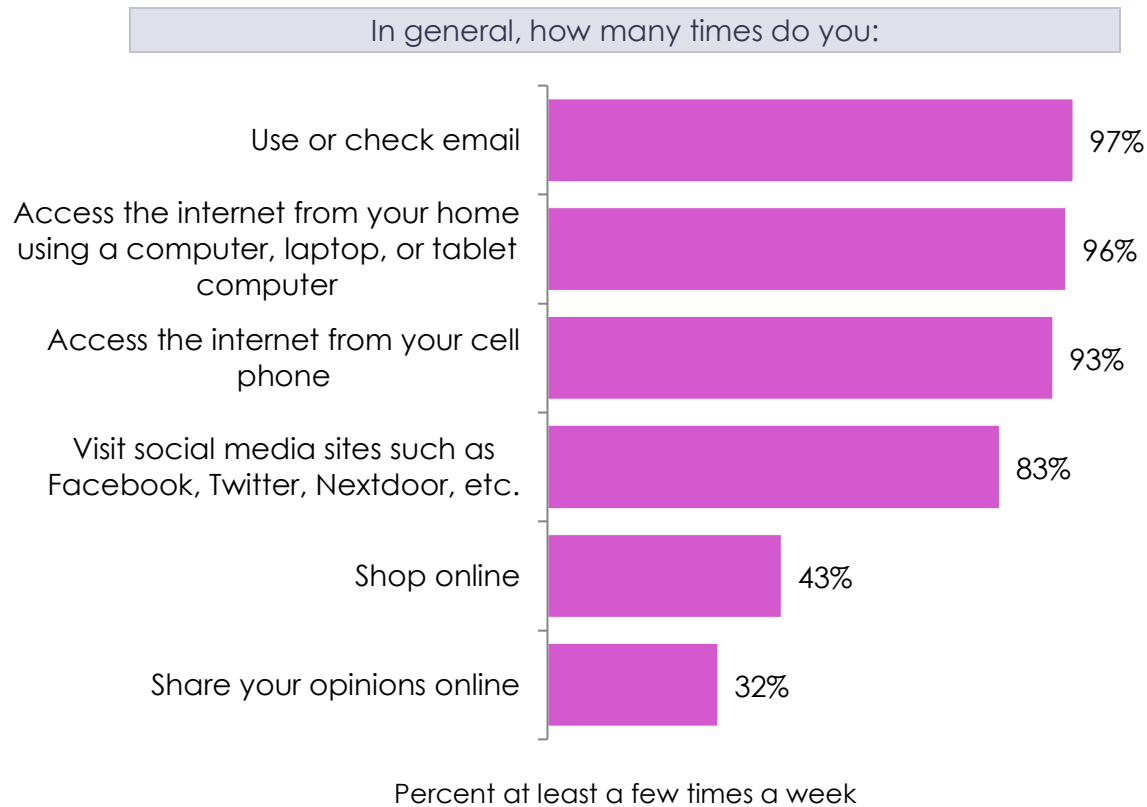
Residents in Bloomington reported higher rates of walking or biking instead of driving, carpooling, volunteering, and watching a local public meeting than residents in other communities across the country (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons* for additional comparisons). Overall, participation rates in Bloomington were similar to peer communities.

Nearly all residents reported they had used or checked email or accessed the internet from home or their cell phone at least a few times a week. Around 8 in 10 survey participants stated they visited social media sites at least a few times a week, while less than half reported engagement at least a few times a week with shopping online (43%) and sharing their opinions online (32%). While most rates of engagement in Bloomington were similar to the nation, residents reported lower levels of shopping online than those seen across the nation (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons* for additional information, comparisons to peers were not available).

City Government

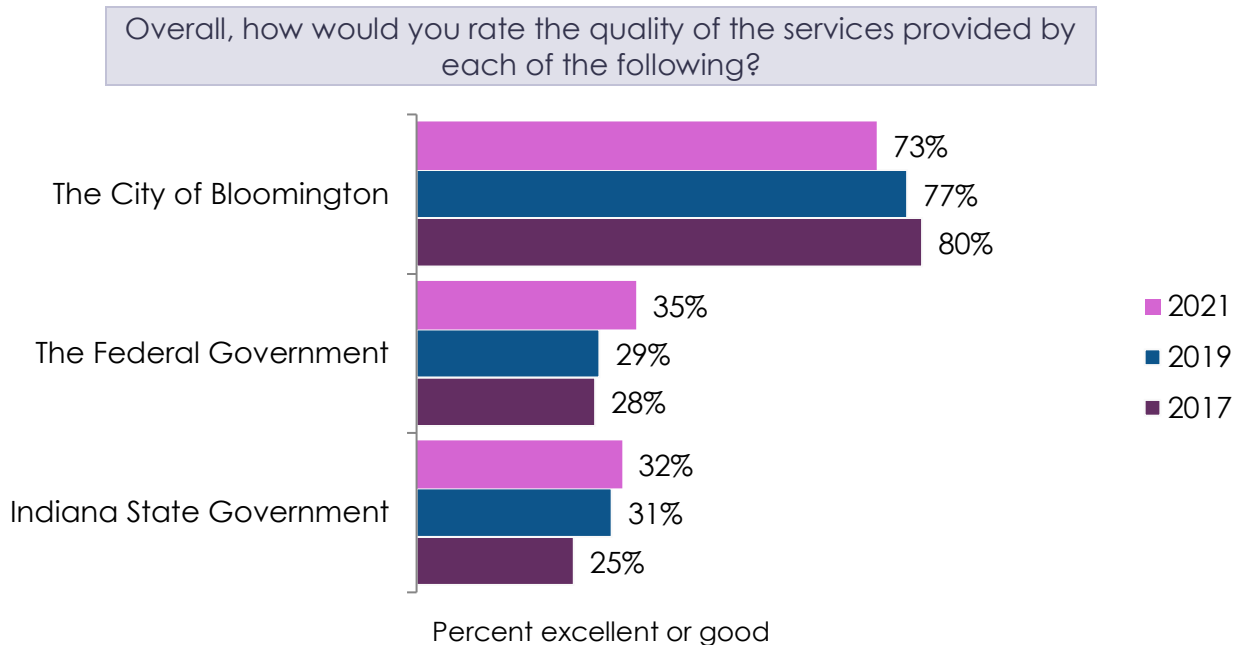
Service delivery is a key function of any local government and enhances residents’ quality of life. The survey included several questions aimed at measuring government performance, the quality and importance of City services, and interactions with Bloomington employees.

Quality of City Government Services

About three-quarters of residents commended the overall quality of services provided to them by the City of Bloomington. In contrast, only about 3 in 10 thought highly of the services provided by the State of Indiana and the Federal Government. Evaluations of City and State government were similar to past years while ratings of the Federal government improved from 2019. These ratings were comparable to those provided in peer and national benchmark communities (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons* for additional information about the benchmark comparisons).

Survey participants who lived in the northeast quadrant awarded higher marks to the services provided by the City of Bloomington than those who had lived in the other regions of the city (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*).

Government Performance

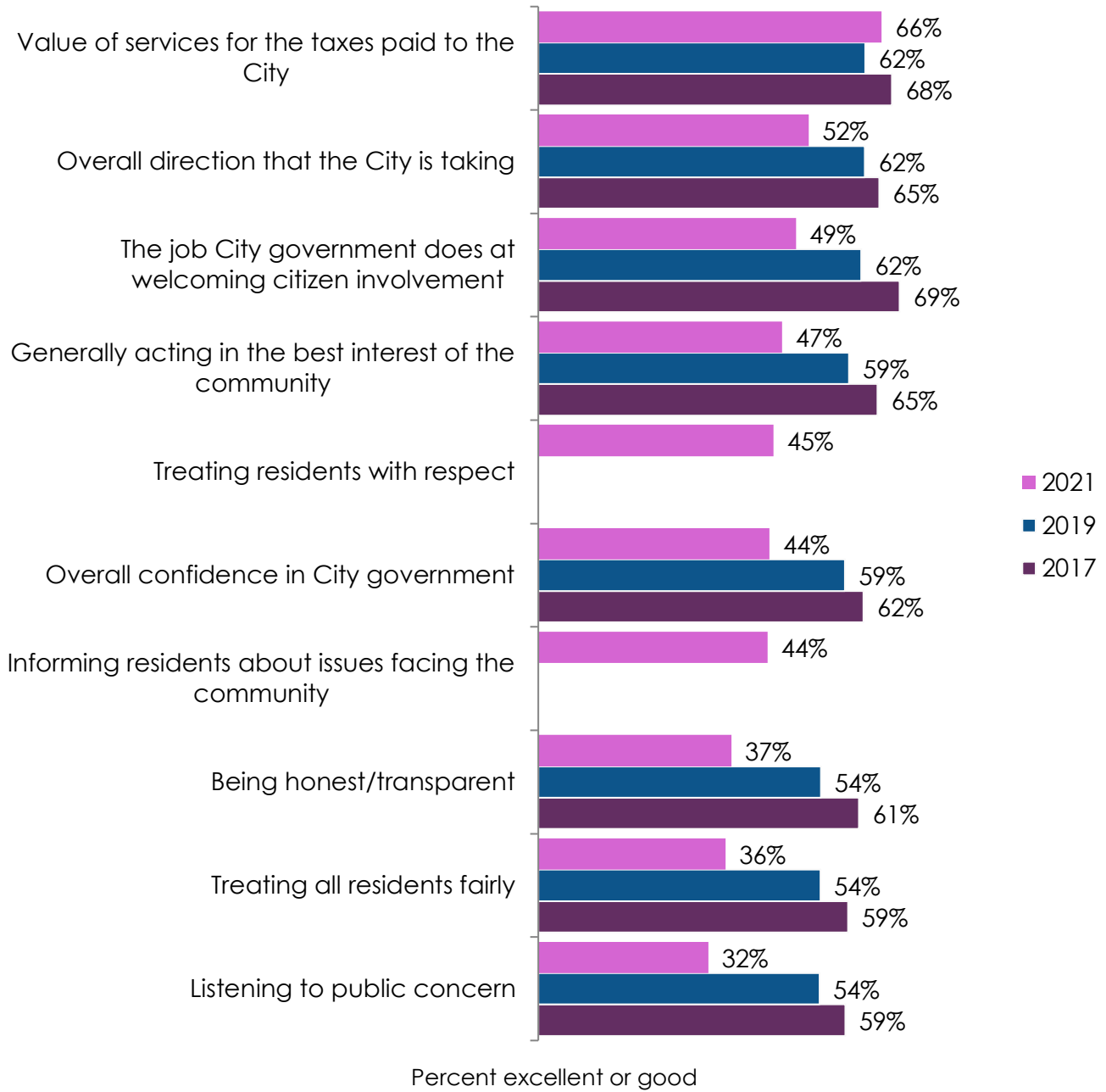
The survey included several questions about City leadership's relationship with their constituents. About two-thirds of residents appreciated the value of services for the taxes they paid and roughly half praised the overall direction the City is taking, the job the government does at welcoming citizen involvement, and the City generally acting in the best interest of the community (see Figure 17 on the next page). Fewer than half gave high ratings to treating all residents fairly, overall confidence in the City government, informing residents about issues facing the community, being honest/transparent, treating all residents with respect, and listening to public concern. All of these ratings declined from 2019 to 2021, except the value of services for the taxes paid to the City, which remained stable.

Most ratings were similar to the national and peer benchmarks, with the exception of treating all residents with respect and treating all residents fairly, which were lower than the national averages (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

Residents from the northwest quadrant tended to provide less positive reviews than those in other quadrants to the value of services for the taxes paid to the City, overall confidence in the City government, being honest/transparent, and informing residents about issues facing the community. Residents who had lived in the community for less than two years gave higher ratings to the overall direction the City is taking than residents who had lived in the community for more than two years (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*.)

City Service Quality and Importance

Survey participants also provided feedback on over 40 specific services provided by the City of Bloomington (see Figure 18 on the next page). Residents were especially appreciative of the quality of safety services (fire and ambulance or emergency medical services), as well as the Fourth Street Arts Fair, trails, public library services, parks, the Lotus Festival, and garbage collection; at least 8 in 10 awarded excellent or good scores to each service. Marks for the quality of open space, street lighting, and storm drainage improved from the last survey iteration. Conversely, residents felt less positively in 2021 about 13 City services: ambulance or emergency medical services, the Farmers market, recycling, animal care and control, police services, snow removal, the City website, small business support, crime prevention, economic development, sustainability efforts, resident interaction with the Bloomington Police Department, and land use, planning, and zoning.

Reviews for power (electric and/or gas) utility, police services, and crime prevention lagged behind U.S. levels; however, all other ratings were on par with national and peer comparison communities (see *Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons*).

Services that were deemed a priority by at least 8 in 10 included preservation of natural areas, health services, small business support, and resident interaction with the Bloomington Police Department. Overall, the importance of most services declined from 2021 to 2019.

Survey participants from the southeast and northeast regions gave higher ratings to police services than those respondents in the northwest. Additionally, respondents in the northwest gave lower ratings to resident interaction with the Bloomington Police Department than respondents in other regions (see *Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics* for additional geographic and demographic comparison information).

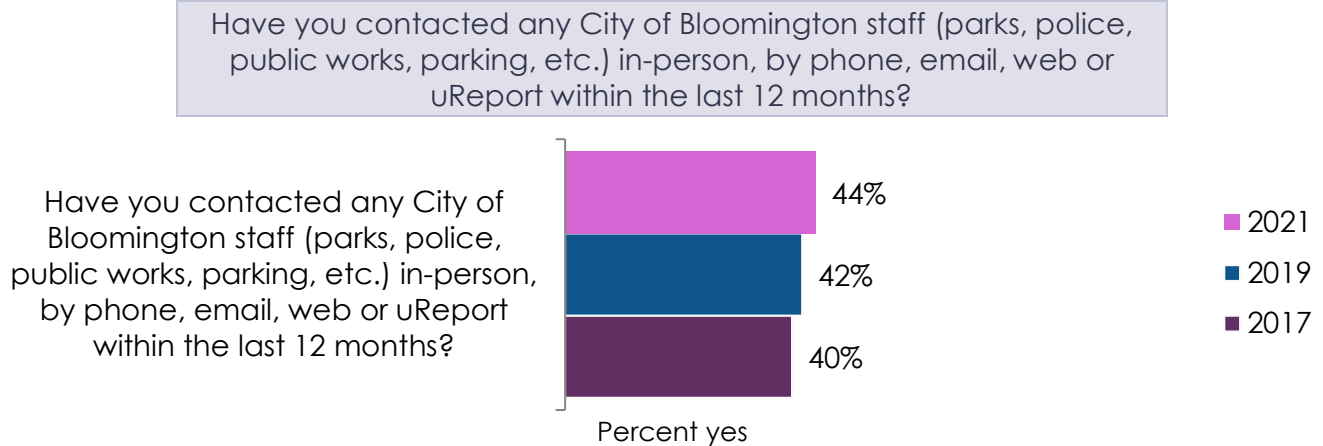

Contact with Bloomington Staff

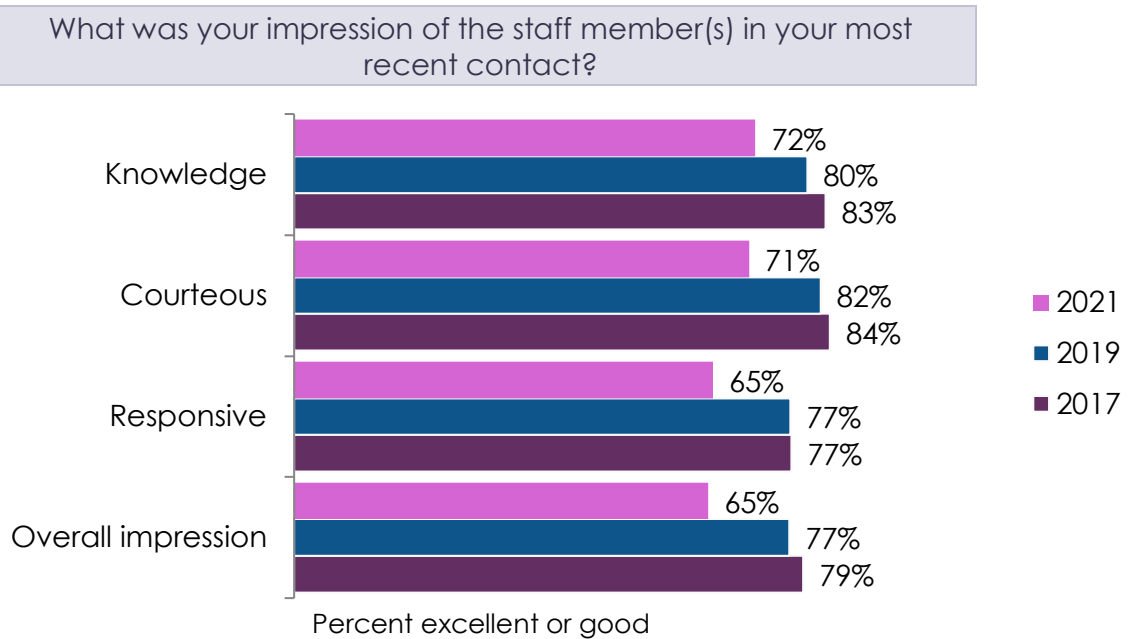
About 4 in 10 Bloomington residents indicated they had contacted a City employee in the 12 months prior to the survey, which was similar to 2019 and to national and peer comparison communities.

Of those who had contacted the City, around 7 in 10 lauded the knowledge and courteousness of the employee and two-thirds gave high marks to how responsive the employee was, as well as their overall impressions of the contact. Residents' evaluations of each aspect of their impression of the staff member they had contact with declined from 2019 to 2021.

Figure 20: Impression of Contact with Staff Compared by Year



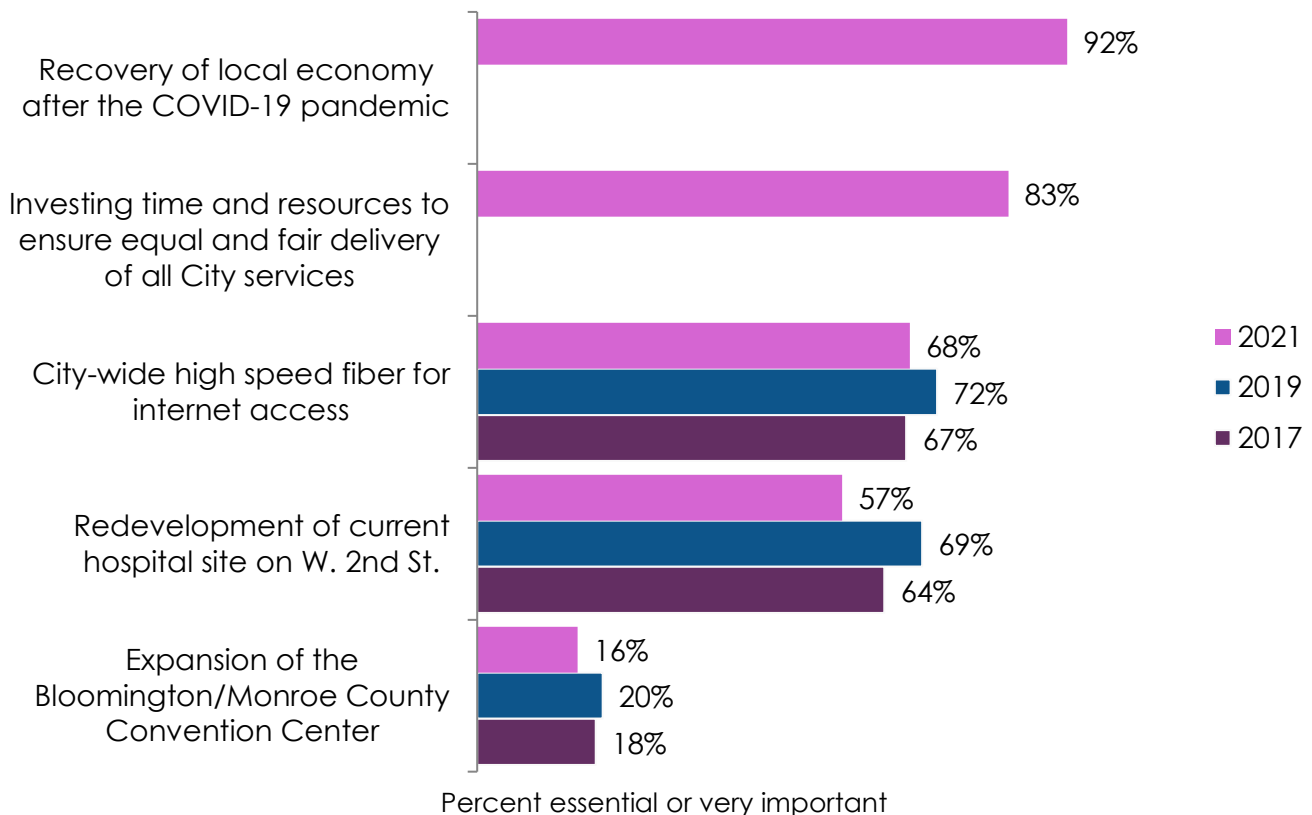
Priorities and Planning

Bloomington residents assessed the importance of several possible community focus areas for the City to emphasize in the next five years. Respondents prioritized recovery of the local economy after the COVID-19 pandemic (92% essential or very important) and investing time and resources to ensure equal and fair delivery of all City services (83%). About 7 in 10 indicated that city-wide high speed fiber for internet access was important and close to 6 in 10 felt similarly about the redevelopment of the current hospital site (a decline from 2019). Only 16% of survey participants felt it was essential or very important for the City to address the expansion of the Bloomington/Monroe County Convention Center.

Respondents from the northeast quadrant were more likely to think city-wide high speed fiber for internet access was essential or very important compared to those in other regions. Residents in the southwest were more likely to think investing time and resources to ensure equal and fair delivery of all City services was more important than their counterparts. Females were more likely than males to think recovery of the local economy after the COVID-19 pandemic was important (*Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics*).

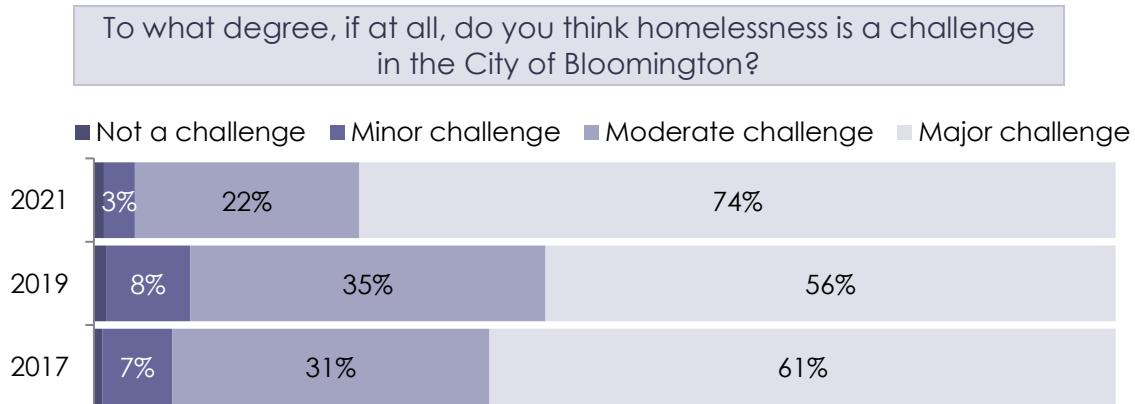
Figure 21: Projects or Issues in Bloomington Compared by Year

Please indicate how important, if at all, each of the following projects or issues will be for the City of Bloomington to address over the next five years.



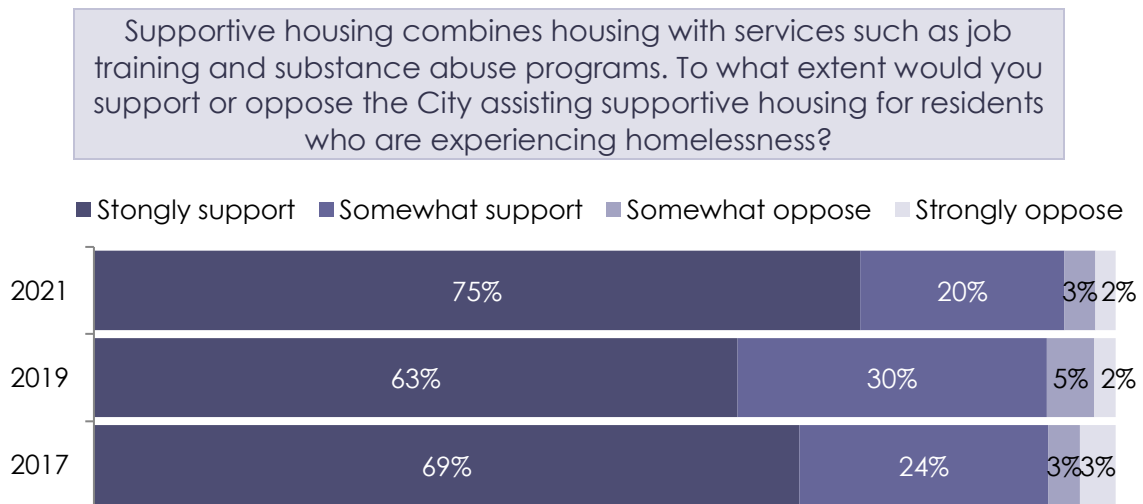
City leadership also asked survey participants to reveal their thoughts on whether homelessness is a challenge in Bloomington. Overall, residents felt strongly that this issue was a challenge, with 74% stating it was a major challenge and 22% indicating homelessness was a moderate challenge. About 3% felt it was a minor challenge and only 1% did not consider it an issue. More residents indicated this was a major challenge in 2021 compared to 2019.

When asked for their opinions about their support for the City assisting with providing supportive housing for those suffering from homelessness, 75% strongly supported this action and 20% somewhat supported it. More residents strongly supported the City providing supportive housing in 2021 than in 2019.

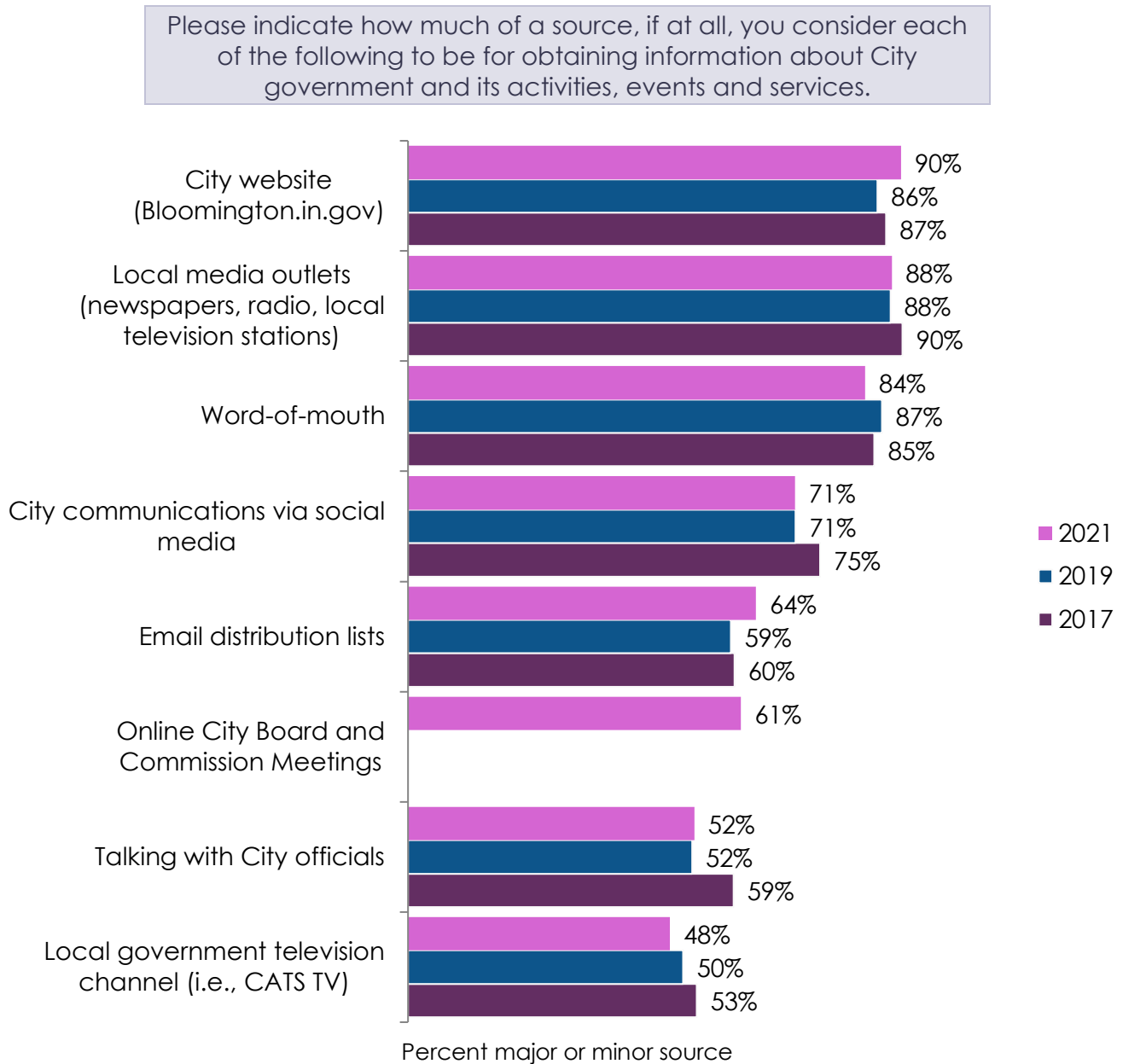
Figure 23: Support for City Assisted Supportive Housing Compared by Year



Information Sources

Regarding their reliance on several outlets for information about the City government and its activities, events, and services, more than 8 in 10 residents reported utilizing the City website, local media outlets, and word-of-mouth as a major or minor source. About 7 in 10 respondents were inclined to get their information from communications via social media and 6 in 10 from email distribution lists and online City Board and Commission Meetings. Around half indicated that talking with City officials and the local government television channel were major or minor sources. Use of information sources tended to be similar with rates reported in 2019.

Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics

The subgroup comparison tables contain the cross tabulations of selected survey questions by respondent characteristics. Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent “real” differences among those populations.

For each pair of subgroups that has a statistically significant difference, an upper case letter denoting significance is shown in the category with the larger column proportion. The letter denotes the category with the smaller column proportion from which it is statistically different. Differences were marked as statistically significant if the probability that the differences were due to chance alone were less than 5%. Categories were not used in comparisons when a column proportion was equal to zero or one.

Items that have no upper case letter denotation in their column and that are also not referred to in any other column were not statistically different.

For example, in Table 50 on the following page, 73% of residents who were 55 years or older (D) gave excellent or good ratings to the city as a place to work. This proportion of residents (D) were statistically higher than residents who were 25-34 years old (B), but were not statistically different from residents who were 18-24 (A) and 35-54 (C). Additionally, respondents who were homeowners (B) gave higher ratings to the city as a place to work compared to those who rented their homes (A).

Appendix E: Benchmark Comparisons

Understanding the Benchmark Comparisons

NRC's database of comparative resident opinion is comprised of resident perspectives gathered in surveys from over 600 communities whose residents evaluated the same kinds of topics on the Bloomington Community Survey. The comparison evaluations are from the most recent survey completed in each community; most communities conduct surveys every year or in alternating years. NRC adds the latest results quickly upon survey completion, keeping the benchmark data fresh and relevant. The communities in the database represent a wide geographic and population range. National benchmark comparisons, as well as peer comparisons (including communities with similar median household income and communities with universities) have been provided when similar questions on the Bloomington Community Survey are included in NRC's database.

Interpreting the Results

Ratings are compared when there are at least five communities in which a similar question was asked. Where comparisons are available, three columns are provided in the table. The first column is the rank assigned to Bloomington's rating among communities where a similar question was asked. The second column is the number of communities that asked a similar question. The final column shows the comparison of Bloomington's rating to the benchmark.

In that final column, Bloomington's results are noted as being "higher" than the benchmark, "lower" than the benchmark or "similar" to the benchmark, meaning that the average rating given by of City residents is statistically similar to or different (greater or lesser) than the benchmark. Being rated as "higher" or "lower" than the benchmark means that Bloomington's average rating for a particular item was more than 10 points different than the benchmark. If a rating was "much higher" or "much lower," then Bloomington's average rating was more than 20 points different when compared to the benchmark.

Comparisons are provided at the national level and to peer communities hand-selected by the City (communities with universities and similar median annual household incomes).

Appendix F: Survey Methodology

Developing the Questionnaire

The City of Bloomington conducted their first community survey in 2017, with the 2021 survey being the third iteration. General community surveys, such as this one, ask recipients their perspectives about the quality of life in the city, their use of city amenities, their opinions on policy issues facing the city and their assessment of city service delivery. The City of Bloomington funded this research. Please contact Mary Catherine Carmichael at carmichm@bloomington.in.gov if you have any questions about the survey.

Developing the Questionnaire

The 2021 survey instrument was developed by starting with the version from the previous implementation in 2019. Few changes were made to the survey in order to maximize comparisons overtime. In an iterative process between City staff and NRC staff, a final five-page questionnaire was created.

Selecting Survey Recipients

“Sampling” refers to the method by which survey recipients are chosen. The “sample” refers to all those who were given a chance to participate in the survey. A list of all households within the zip codes serving Bloomington was purchased from Go-Dog Direct based on updated listings from the United States Postal Service, updated every three months, providing the best representation of all households in a specific geographic location. NRC used the USPS data to select the survey recipients.

A larger list than needed was pulled so that a process referred to as “geocoding” could be used to eliminate addresses from the list that were outside Bloomington’s boundaries. Geocoding is a computerized process in which addresses are compared to electronically mapped boundaries and coded as inside or outside desired boundaries; in this case, within Bloomington. All addresses determined to be outside the study boundaries were eliminated from the list of potential households. Each address identified as being within city boundaries was further identified as being within one of the four quadrants. A random selection was made of the remaining addresses to create a mailing list of 3,000 addresses.

To choose the 3,000 survey recipients, a systematic sampling method was applied to the list of households previously screened for geographic location. Systematic sampling is a procedure whereby a complete list of all possible households is culled, selecting every Nth one, giving each eligible household a known probability of selection, until the appropriate number of households is selected. Multi-family housing units were selected at a higher rate as residents of this type of housing typically respond at lower rates to surveys than do those in

single-family housing units. In general, because of the random sampling techniques used, the displayed sampling density will closely mirror the overall housing unit density (which may be different from the population density). While the theory of probability assumes no bias in selection, there may be some minor variations in practice (meaning, an area with only 15% of the housing units might be selected at an actual rate that is slightly above or below that).

An individual within each household was randomly selected to complete the survey using the birthday method. The birthday method selects a person within the household by asking the “person whose birthday has most recently passed” to complete the questionnaire. The underlying assumption in this method is that day of birth has no relationship to the way people respond to surveys. This instruction was contained in the cover letter accompanying the questionnaire.

In addition to the random sample survey, a link to an online open participation survey was publicized through various channels including the Bloomington website and social media. This open participation survey was identical to the random sample survey and open to all City residents (for additional information on the open participation survey results, please see the *Bloomington Supplemental Web Report 2021* under separate cover).

Survey Administration and Response

Each selected household was contacted three times. First, a prenotification announcement, informing the household members that they had been selected to participate in the City of Bloomington Community Survey was sent on March 17, 2021. Approximately one week after mailing the prenotification, each household was mailed a survey containing a cover letter signed by Mayor Hamilton enlisting participation. The cover letter and postcard included a URL where respondents could go to complete the survey online, if desired. The packet also contained a pre-addressed, postage-paid return envelope in which the survey recipients could return the completed questionnaire directly to NRC. A reminder letter and survey, scheduled to arrive one week after the first survey, was the final contact. The second cover letter asked those who had not completed the survey to do so and those who have already done so to refrain from turning in another survey and also included the URL for the online response option. The survey was available in English. The online open participation survey became available to all residents on April 21, 2021 and remained open for two weeks.

The mailings were sent starting in March and completed surveys were collected over the following seven weeks. About 6% of the 3,000 surveys mailed were returned because the housing unit was vacant or the postal service was unable to deliver the survey as addressed. Of the 2,812 households presumed to have received a survey, 527 completed the survey (including 255 online surveys), providing a response rate of 19%. Additionally, responses were tracked by geographic area; response rates by quadrant ranged from 13% to 24%. The response rate(s) were calculated using AAPOR’s response rate #2¹ for mailed surveys of unnamed persons. Additionally, 235 residents completed the online open participation

survey and the results for this survey can be found under a separate cover (*Bloomington Supplemental Web Report*).

95% Confidence Intervals

The 95% confidence interval (or “margin of error”) quantifies the “sampling error” or precision of the estimates made from the survey results. A 95% confidence interval can be calculated for any sample size, and indicates that in 95 of 100 surveys conducted like this one, for a particular item, a result would be found that is within four percentage points of the result that would be found if everyone in the population of interest was surveyed.² The practical difficulties of conducting any resident survey may introduce other sources of error in addition to sampling error. Despite best efforts to boost participation and ensure potential inclusion of all households, some selected households will decline participation in the survey (referred to as non-response error) and some eligible households may be unintentionally excluded from the listed sources for the sample (referred to as coverage error).

While the margin of error for the survey is generally no greater than plus or minus four percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample; results for subgroups will have wider confidence intervals. Where estimates are given for subgroups, they are less precise.

² A 95% confidence interval indicates that for every 100 random samples of this many residents, 95 of the confidence intervals created will include the “true” population response. This theory is applied in practice to mean that the “true” perspective of the target population lies within the confidence interval created for a single survey. For example, if 75% of residents rate a service as “excellent” or “good,” then the 4% margin of error (for the 95% confidence interval) indicates that the range of likely responses for the entire community is between 71% and 79%. This source of uncertainty is called sampling error. In addition to sampling error, other sources of error may affect any survey, including the non-response of residents with opinions different from survey responders. Though standardized on The NCS, on other surveys, differences in question wording, order, translation and data entry, as examples, can lead to somewhat varying results.

Survey Processing (Data Entry)

Upon receipt, completed surveys were assigned a unique identification number. Additionally, each survey was reviewed and “cleaned” as necessary. For example, a question may have asked a respondent to pick two items out of a list of five, but the respondent checked three; in this case, NRC would use protocols to randomly choose two of the three selected items for inclusion in the dataset.

All surveys then were entered twice into an electronic dataset; any discrepancies were resolved in comparison to the original survey form. Range checks as well as other forms of quality control were also performed.

NRC used Polco, an online public engagement tool designed primarily for local governments, to collect online survey data. Use of an online system means all collected data are entered into the dataset when the respondents submit the surveys. Skip patterns are programmed into system so respondents are automatically “skipped” to the appropriate question based on the individual responses being given. Online programming also allows for more rigid control of the data format, making extensive data cleaning unnecessary.

A series of quality control checks were also performed in order to ensure the integrity of the web data. Steps may include and not be limited to reviewing the data for clusters of repeat IP addresses and time stamps (indicating duplicate responses) and removing empty submissions (questionnaires submitted with no questions answered).

Weighting the Data

The demographic characteristics of the survey respondents were compared to those found in the 2010 United States Census and 2017 American Community Survey. The primary objective of weighting survey data is to make the survey sample reflective of the larger population of the community. The variables used for weighting the household respondent data were gender, age, housing unit type (attached or detached), housing tenure (rent or own), race/ethnicity, and area of residence. No adjustments were made for design effects. The results of the weighting scheme are presented in the table on the following page.

Analyzing the Data

The electronic dataset was analyzed by NRC staff using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). For the most part, frequency distributions and mean ratings are presented in the body of the report. A complete set of frequencies for each survey question is presented in Appendix B: Complete Set of Survey Responses. Also included are results by respondent characteristics (Appendix D: Responses to Select Questions by Respondent Characteristics). Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of selected survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent “real” differences among those populations. Where differences between subgroups are statistically significant, they have been denoted with an uppercase letter. Ratings between 2021 and 2019 can be considered statistically significant if there are differences of six percentage points or more.
