When the city police bought the armored F-150, it had bulletproof, whatever you call them, metal on the side. At a time when there was issues with the Black community and the city, they didn't announce it ahead of time and scared virtually every African American who lives a couple blocks west of us, where we are right now, into thinking that it was aimed at them, which pretty much was.

With the convention center, even though it was the Monroe County Convention Center, he tried to take it over and negotiated separately with hotels, and just didn't care what the County said. Even though it was a county food, beverage, hotel increase tax of 1 percent, I think there's 5 or \$6 million now in the bank because they've been collecting it and not spending it.

Lower Cascade Road. You came up on the interstate, but if you came up on Old 37, at one point you can get off and ride through the old old 37, and people like it. The mayor wanted to close the road and everything else. There's been no one who wants to do it, but he announces it and it will be done.

Seventh Street. Ken Nunn, who advertises incessantly on TV here -- you have to know who he is -- even he wrote a letter to the editor complaining about Seventh Street and what they did with it. There's a bicycle path and it's a bus lane, there's a bus there. And I have

seen -- I hate to say this because I'll be 74 on Monday, so when I say "old ladies," I do mean older than me, but I realize to most people I'm not young. But old ladies have gone down the bike path in their cars because they couldn't figure out which was the lane to go driving. And Ken Nunn complained about it. Maybe he had a case about, for all I know, of somebody.

Then he announced he wanted a 1 percent income tax increase. Never provided an answer what he'd do with the money, still hasn't. I mean, "we'll improve the city and make it a better place to live" is not an answer because everybody in the county -- it becomes a county tax. So Ellettsville did not want it at all. So he just gave a raise to firefighters and police and EMTs, which was a good thing to do. But they didn't want the 1 percent. Unionville, the same way. The county commissioners, who knows?

And then last, because I don't want to take too long, he ignored real costs. When he made this announcement, county leaders came out in the newspaper and said it would bust the county budget. Then about the same time perhaps they

A Greg McKim, who then was a county councilman, at a meeting at Batchelor Middle School, which was across the block from my house pretty much, so I went. And then it's now increased in size but it used to be the Clear Creek-Perry Fire District.

Now I think it's the Monroe County Fire District.

And then private companies have said they'd go out of business including, so happens, my trash company, Ava's Trash Service, which is a woman-owned and woman-run trash company, and so I like supporting them. She said in one of the bills -- because it's online, she said, "We'll have to go out of business because, without the residents who live in the areas threatened with annexation, we can't make a budget."

There may be others I don't know about, but there's real costs. Never tried to schmooze us.

Oh, and I forgot to say. In the initial announcement about it, we don't get to vote in the next election. Whenever the next election is, if they take us over today and the next election is November, for example, I can't vote in it. So not only is he alienating me of my property, he's alienating me of my right to

vote. Nobody wants me to bore them with the history of voting rights in the country, but he would alienate me of my rights to vote.

For all that, I think that the city -- I've never seen an interest group of city residents going, "Yes, we want to annex these areas."

They don't care. And most of them --

Oh, when he announced the multi-unit housing, that's taking a plot where there is a single-family house and putting something extra because we need more housing. He never tried to win over the people in the area. So Elm Heights --

(Stenographer clarification.)

A Elm Heights is an area just south of the university. It used to be a pretty much faculty neighborhood, and there's more and more student housing there, which is typical of anyplace that's on a periphery of a college campus. But he just announced he was going to go allow that there, that is, if interest can come in and buy your house and then put up a twoplex or fourplex, whatever -- I don't think it can be bigger than a fourplex, that was fine.

And I exercise with a fellow who is one of

the original families in Bloomington. In fact, the street that's just west of us, that's his family. And the other half of his family are the Kinsers. So they've been in this town. He lives in the house his grandfather built.

He's incensed about it, and he's a city resident. He doesn't mind other stuff. But you never asked, you never put it to a vote, you never held any kind of meeting. The worst of them, I shouldn't say it for the record but I'm going to, I believe the real reason he wanted this was the extra 16,000 residents from all the areas that are threatened, not just 1B, would allow him to play in a bigger group at national meetings of mayors because we'd hit 100,000 people in the city. Is there anything in addition to or beyond what you've already testified to or what you provided in your notes in Exhibit 53 that you would add if you were testifying at trial, beyond what you've said here today?

## Indiana Rules of Trial Procedure Depositions Upon Oral Examination Rule 30

- (e) Submission to witness--Changes--Signing.
- (1) When the testimony is fully transcribed, the deposition shall be submitted to the witness for reading and signing and shall be read to or by him, unless such reading and signing have been waived by the witness and by each party. "Submitted to the witness" as used in this subsection shall mean (a) mailing of written notification by registered or certified mail to the witness and each attorney attending the deposition that the deposition can be read and examined in the office of the officer before whom the deposition was taken, or (b), mailing the original deposition, by registered or certified mail, to the witness at an address designated by the witness or his attorney, if requested to do so by the witness, his attorney, or the party taking the deposition.
- (2) If the witness desires to change any answer in the deposition submitted to him, each change, with a statement of the reason therefor, shall be made

by the witness on a separate form provided by the officer, shall be signed by the witness and affixed to the original deposition by the officer. A copy of such changes shall be furnished by the officer to each party.

- (3) If the reading and signing have not been waived by the witness and by each party the deposition shall be signed by the witness and returned by him to the officer within thirty (30) days after it is submitted to the witness. If the deposition has been returned to the officer and has not been signed by the witness, the officer shall execute a certificate of that fact, attach it to the original deposition and deliver it to the party taking it. In such event, the deposition may be used by any party with the same force and effect as though it had been signed by the witness.
- (4) In the event the deposition is not returned to the officer within thirty (30) days after it has been submitted to the witness, the reporter shall execute a certificate of that fact and cause the certificate to be delivered to the party taking it. In such event, any party may use a copy of the

deposition with the same force and effect as though the original had been signed by the witness.
